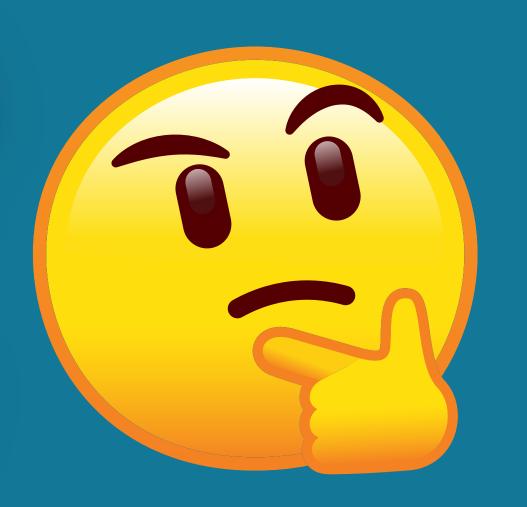


WANT TO SHOOT A MUSIC VIDEO, BUT DON'T KNOW WHERE TO START?

MUSIC VIDEO CREATION TIMELINE

Finalize + **Choose Your** Song

Pick a single with the widest appeal. Avoid cursing heavy content if you're planning on pushing it across platforms that like to promote clean content.

Create the Idea

Pick visuals that work with the song and events that will take place over the video. Choose time of day, location, people involved, etc. Aim for something striking and memorable but appropriate for many ages.



Plan and **Schedule Your** Shoot

Pick the place, ask friends to help, choose outfits or props, borrow what you need and schedule everything professionally for the best results + energy for your project.





Nail the Shoot

Keep focused, get the shots you need, be creative in the moment, and perform to the best of your ability. Make sure your files are saved!

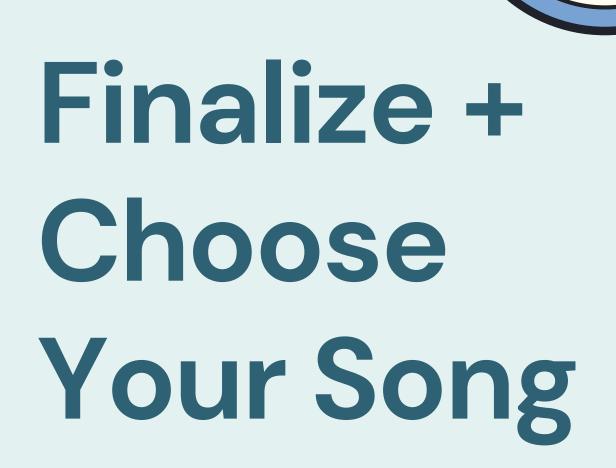




Keep things tight in your editing but not chaotic too many quick cuts can end up seeming amateur. Avoid harsh filters that dimish your footage's quality.









- Pick a single with the widest appeal.
- Choose a song with a catchy hook and make sure ALL lyrics are understandable to listeners.
- Test your songs with your trusted people. Give them options. Have a blind vote if you have to. But ask them all to pick the best single from your options.
- This is like doing market testing like labels do with their artists. It could save you from spending a lot of effort on a big mistake.



- Try to think in visuals, not literal situations. If it's a breakup, write down ideas of what that LOOKS like for you. Video is a visual medium.
- Do not create an idea around things you don't have or would have to buy (a plane! etc)
- Make sure the idea relates to the song or represents the feeling the song gives you.
- Don't bite off more than you can chew, plot wise. Simpler will be better, every time.

Plan and Schedule Your Shoot



- Decide what you need and make lists.
 Borrow and plan. Check the weather on proposed shoot dates.
- Ask friends or family to help if you need them. Be respectful but make sure they know this is important.
- Confirm everyone's attendance for the shoot date and time. Check out locations in advance and take pictures.
- Make sure you're safe and pack food and water, a medical kit, and anything else you might need.
- Send out a schedule to anyone involved before the shoot of the scenes you're doing, what's happening in them, and who is in each scene if you're using actors or friends as characters in the video.

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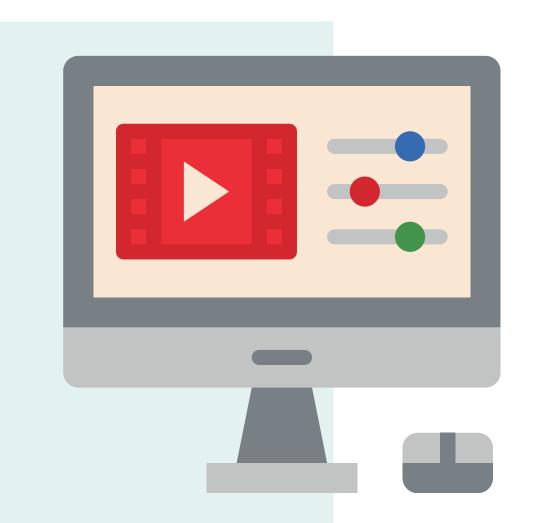
Nail the Shoot



- Manage your time. Make sure you're not over spending time on one scene. Time is the most important resource on a shoot day because time = light.

- Thank everyone. Be professional.



Edit + Color Correct for Posting

- Take the focus to nail your performance shots. This will be the heart of your video so make sure it looks the way you want it to.
- Watch your takes so you can correct mistakes or physical actions you're doing that don't look right on camera (KEY!)
- Get B-Roll Footage (Street signs, random cars, graffitti, etc) to help you later during the editing process.
- Don't over-work. It's possible to edit something too much and chop it to the point where it loses it's original natural energy or flow. Know when to call it a day.
